Welcome

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. - BCP, p. 265

Welcome, Guests! We invite you to fill out one the welcome cards in the pew rack in front of you. You may give it to one of the clergy or place it in the offering plate. After worship, we invite you to join us for fellowship in our parish hall.

Welcome, Children! At Christ Church children are invited to be themselves and to participate fully in our community. Sunday School for all ages follows the 8:00 liturgy (beginning at 9:15 downstairs in Harris House).

A Restroom is located outside the doors in the corner of the church that lead directly to the parish house. You will find one in a hallway immediately to the right after exiting the church. This restroom is handicapped accessible. Restrooms are also available in the parish house. After exiting the church, go up the stairs, turn left, and walk all the way around toward the office.

Hard of Hearing? If you need help hearing the service, we have devices for you to use. See a member of the Hospitality Team for assistance.

Accessibility: The church is completely accessible. If you wish to go to the parish house, you will find a lift outside the door leading toward the parish house. This lift will take you to the parish hall and the classroom level.

The Liturgy in Lent – Meditative Prayer

According to the Rule of the Society of St. John the Evangelist, "meditation opens our minds and hearts, and our response to God's gift and disclosure is kindled by the Spirit within us. God may touch us through icons, images, and symbols, impregnating our hearts with grace and furthering our transformation 'from one degree of glory to another.'"

At the beginning of the liturgy and following the sermon a singing bowl will be rung to invite us into a time of silent meditation. You may use this time of silence however you wish. For example, you might focus on the icon of Christ near the altar, meditating on this

image. Or you might use a method of prayer called the Breath Prayer.

To use this method, follow these simple steps:

- ◆ Close your eyes and take regular, deep breaths.
- Once you've established a regular rhythm, pray one sentence continually that means something for you (for example, "Lord, fill me with your peace" or "Christ, surround me with your presence" or choose a favorite phrase from Scripture or the Prayer Book)
- ✤ As you inhale, imagine the Holy Spirit filling you.
- ✤ As you exhale, imagine all the cares, concerns, and activities that fill your life being breathed away.

"In the radical simplicity of contemplative prayer we surrender ourselves to the mystery beyond words of Christ's abiding in us, and our abiding in him close to the Father's heart.

Meditative prayer is the receptive and responsive prayer of our whole selves."

The Holy Eucharist

Please participate with us in worship. This booklet contains most of the liturgy.

The texts for this liturgy are taken from *The Book of Common Prayer, Enriching Our Worship,* A New Zealand Prayer Book, and the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

Although there are customary postures (such as standing and kneeling) in Episcopal worship, you are invited to be seated at any point, according to your needs and comfort.

 \blacksquare As the singing bowl is rung, the congregation kneels for silent prayer (please sit if you are unable to kneel). The singing bowl will be rung a second time to mark the end of this time of meditation.

The liturgy continues with the Penitential Order; the congregation remains kneeling, as they are able.

The First Reading

Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt-- a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

The Second Reading

Hebrews 5:5-10

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place, "You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek." In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say-- `Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

You draw all people to yourself: bring us out of our slavery to possessions and away from the desire for wealth.

Lord, in your mercy *Hear our prayer.*

We know that we must die so that we may truly live: strengthen all who suffer in mind or body.

Here the intercessor prays for parishioners on our prayer list; please add your own prayers, also.

Lord, in your mercy *Hear our prayer*.

We anticipate the eternal life you promise through Jesus; be with all who have died, that they may be at peace.

Here the intercessor prays for those, if any, in whose memory greens have been given; please add your own prayers, also.

Lord, in your mercy *Hear our prayer.*

The celebrant concludes with a collect.

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you. Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, through Jesus Christ our Lord. You bid your faithful people cleanse their hearts, and prepare with joy for the Paschal feast; that, fervent in prayer and in works of mercy, and renewed by your Word and Sacraments, they may come to the fullness of grace which you have prepared for those who love you. Therefore, joining with Angels and Archangels and with the faithful of every generation, we lift our voices with all creation as we sing:

Celebrant and People Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Then the Celebrant continues

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ's Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. *AMEN*.

An Invitation to Communion and Healing: Instructions Concerning our Customs

 \clubsuit All are invited to receive Holy Communion. The bread is received in the open palm. The wine, if desired, may be taken from the common cup by drinking (placing your hand gently on the base of the chalice to guide it). You may also receive by intinction, dipping the bread into the wine. Please be careful not to put your fingers in the wine. If you do not wish to receive from the chalice at all, please cross your arms over your chest. Even if not receiving the wine, please do not leave the altar rail until the chalice passes you.

Those who do not wish to receive Communion are invited to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

B Healing Prayer is offered during the Communion portion of worship. You are invited to come to the healing station before or after you receive Communion. At the healing station you can tell the healing minister of some concern for which you want prayer; however you don't have to say anything. You can be an intercessor and ask for prayers for others. You can stand or use the kneelers. The healing ministers normally put oil on your forehead but sometimes a person's hands can be anointed. People who come for healing have a variety of experiences. Some feel a warming or tingling sensation or some other physical sensation; some hear the minister speak in a (prayer) language; some have no physical sensations, but experience a deep peace. You may feel that something has happened or you may not. Healing, in whatever form, often occurs later. Healing is a sacramental act, an outward and visible sign of the interior work of the Holy Spirit. This means that you can be assured that God will do what's best for you.

The Post-Communion Prayer

After Communion, the Celebrant says Let us pray.
